- 12 Years a Slave: In the antebellum United States, Solomon Northup, a free black man from upstate New York, is abducted and sold into slavery.
- Selma: A historical drama about the 1965 Selma to Montgomery voting rights marches led by Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. and Representative John Lewis, among others.
- The Best of Enemies: Civil rights activist Ann Atwater faces off against C.P. Ellis, Exalted Cyclops of the Ku Klux Klan, in 1971 Durham, North Carolina over the issue of school integration.

A tribute to author Chris Singleton's late mother, Sharonda Coleman-Singleton (2015 Mother Emmanuel victim).
- <u>The Day You Begin</u>, by National Book Award winner Jacqueline Woodson and two-time Pura Belpré Illustrator Award winner Rafael López, *a poignant*, *yet heartening book about finding courage to connect. It's about how sometimes you can feel like an outsider but sharing our stories can bring us together.*
